Christ is coming. He's another day closer to being here at the writing of this article, and several days closer at your reading it (Unless He's already returned, in which case, the paper has been burned up; the computer destroyed; and the new heavens and new earth have been established and you won't care about this article: you'll be in the eternal presence of God. Christ is going to return. It's His promise: 7 "And behold, I am coming soon. Blessed is the one who keeps the words of the prophecy of this book." ...²⁰ He who testifies to these things says, "Surely I am coming soon." Amen. Come, Lord Jesus! 21 The grace of the Lord Jesus be with all. Amen. (Rev. 22:7, 20-21)

You better not pout; you better not cry ... He sees you when you're sleeping; He knows when you're awake. He knows when you've been bad or good; so be good for goodness sake! But while this is also true of God (even if it is a song about Santa Clause), our God is not a Santa Clause God, though our Lord is a giver of much better gifts (Plus, He doesn't wait until the last minute to go out and buy them.), our God is a giver of gifts that are greater than those we unwrap on Christmas morning.

Advent is a season that confronts us with who we are and what we need. Christmas means very little, if we don't appreciate our great need. We are weak, afflicted, suffer with sickness and sorrows, fears and death.



I know that many of us have already set up our decorations and trees. While I personally struggle against that, I understand the impulse behind it: we are looking forward to something; we are awaiting a day or days of joy. In that way, setting up for Christmas isn't such a bad thing. We are looking forward to a better day.

Christmas is a time in which even the world pauses to celebrate (even if it's in a pagan way), but we take some time to rejoice in family and friends and have a breath of fresh air in a world full of darkness and hate and death.

Our God came into this world in our own flesh to bear our sin, suffering, and death that we might not die eternally. He was born to bear our sins to the cross; to die our death and rise that we might rise again to glory with our bodies intact and perfected – that we might be as He is: not God, but glorified, as He has been glorified.

Apart from repentance and faith (which is to say the same thing twice) we can't enter the kingdom of heaven. But Advent looks towards Christmas just as it looks toward the last day, and just as it looks toward the Lord's Body and Blood in the Sacrament: here we receive the foretaste of the feast to come, where the Lord Advents with us, and Christmases with us, and Good Fridays with us, and Easters with us.

He's coming soon: stay tuned this Sunday and the eternal Sunday to come. Blessed Advent.

few container sites along the way. We even spent the night at one of our orphanages, allowing us to spend a little extra time with those living there. We also began a brandnew program to extend visits to the orphanages and elderly care facilities, working with local churches and members. Another highlight is that we were able to meet and spend some time with three of our coworkers from Russia, Nikolai, Valentina, and Pastor Evgeny who works with the Hannah House. We were able to accomplish so much in the short time we were there. God truly blessed our time together. Please, keep all our coworkers, Directors, children the elderly and those who are in the prisons and in the hospitals in your prayers. The message that we heard from all of our friends is this, "we want our lives to be just like they used to be, and we want you to come back to see us again." Prayers change things. Parking Lot Project Up-date

The start of this project has been delayed. At this time, we don't anticipate that it will start until sometime after December 11. It is expected to take about two weeks to complete. During this time, people attending worship services should enter the driveway north of the sanctuary and park in the graveled or grassy area north of the driveway. You will be able to enter church through the doors on the north side of the sanctuary. Volunteers will provide valet parking for those who needs special assistance by driving your vehicle to the entrance of the narthex.

LWML Mission Project for the month of December is the Hastings Food Pantry. A box will be in the back of the church to place your donations of non-perishable food items and paper goods.

Quilting/Sewing Group will meet at Zion Lutheran Church on Monday, January 9, at 10:00 AM. There are usually 5-6 ladies from each congregation who tie an average of 20-22 quilts each month. In 2022, 268 quilts have been completed and taken to the Orphan Grain Train facility in Grand Island. Other sewn items donated to Orphan Grain Train are book bags, diapers, pillowcase dresses, blankets, and comforters. In 2022, a total of 813 sewn items were donated. Marge Peterson made over 20 plastic mats that were donated to Orphan Grain train. Now that she has two new shoulders, she hopes to make about two mats per week. That is a lot of plastic bags being recycled. The sewing group is in much need for sheets to be used for quilt backs and liners. You can contact Janey Sittner if you would like more information.
